## THE PARISH CHURCH



Miss R. Wade and myself have once again been elected Churchwardens for a further year of office and we would thank those who elected us and hope very much their confidence is not misplaced.

We earnestly seek support in whatever way possible and would thank very much those who are already helping in regularly cleaning the Church, taking part in flower arranging (more volunteers are specially needed for this), and cutting the Churchyard grass and hedges (again a few more helpers would be gladly accepted to make our "Garden of Rest" as good as any other you may see).

## KITCHEN CAPERS

I "acquired" this recipe for lasagne at the City College many years ago, and I still find it the most tasty version I have tried.

### Ingredients (for 4 people)

Approx.  $\frac{1}{2}$  lb. lasagne (green or white)  
1 oz. butter  
1 oz. flour  
1 onion  
1 carrot  
1 stick celery  
1 oxo cube  
 $\frac{3}{4}$  lb. minced beef  
 $\frac{1}{4}$  lb. minced lean pork  
salt and pepper  
1 tsp. tomato puree  
1 glass white wine

} finely chopped  
} get your butcher to  
} mince these together

### Sauce

$1\frac{1}{2}$  oz. butter  
1 heaped tbsp. flour  
 $\frac{3}{4}$  pt. milk  
nutmeg



parmesan cheese - grated - for topping

## Method

Melt butter and sweat vegetables in pan with lid on for 5 - 10 minutes. Add meat and continue cooking for further 10 - 15 minutes, stirring occasionally. Shake over flour and stir in, and season well. Add tomato puree and wine and crumbled oxo cube. Simmer slowly for 1 hour, adding a small quantity of water if it gets too dry.

Make white sauce and season well with salt, pepper and nutmeg.

Boil lasagne in salted water for 10 - 15 minutes and then drain well.

Butter dish and put in layer of meat sauce then a layer of white sauce then a layer of lasagne. Continue doing these layers until ingredients are used up, ending with a layer of white sauce. Sprinkle a good quantity of grated parmesan cheese over the surface and bake in a moderate oven for 20 - 30 minutes.
