JUBILEE CELEBRATION.

As the commencement of the Jubilee movement in this Parish a meeting was called by the Rev. A. W. UPCHER on Wednesday April 27th, in the Schoolroom, at which the following gentlemen attended,

when it was decided to solicit donations from Owners, Farmers and Tradesmen to raise sufficient money to provide every Parishioner a free meal on June 21st.

A Committee was selected from the above, and R. D. Day appointed as Secretary, who commenced collecting on 3rd, of May.

On Thursday May 12th. an Entertainment, got up by Mr. Quantrell's Family and friends was given in the barn which was well filled; £2 of the proceeds was given to the Jubilee fund. All the printing for the entertainment and in connection with the Jubilee was executed by R. D. Day free of charge.

On May 24th, the second meeting of the Committee was held, when it was decided that all provisions required should be supplied by the tradesmen of the village, and the services of a Band engaged for the 21st. of June.

Being unable to get a reply from the Bandmaster, the Secretary was obliged to call a third meeting of the Committee on Monday June the 6th. which was attended by the Bandmaster and final arrangments made.

A. W. and thiss Droben. Sports were then indulged a, and at intervals the children were presented with packets of sweets and a good supply of nuts, and the men with tobacco. Thanks are the totall weakelped. to bring the affair to such a successful issue. Special thanks are also due to those ladies who undertook the cooking arrangments, which in all cases were admir-Cards of invitation were given for every individual in the parish, numbering about 433, free of cost, and e few tickets were sold to non-residents. There were only a few who did not respond to the invitation to the meal, but joined the company in the evening. Dancing was freely indulged in to the strains of Barham's band. In the evening as many as desired indulged in a second meal, with plenty of ale &c. The proceedings, which had been most orderly and enjoyable throughout, were brought to a close with a fine display of fireworks. the company dispersing about 11 30. On the following day the surplus provision was distributed to those unable to attend, and to others with large families. One slight accident occurred to W. Curtis, who having climbed the pole, and coming down too rapidly sprained his ankle. From Norfolk News of July 2nd.

THE STAR OF INDIA.

The marriage of the Princess Alice took place very quietly on account of the recent death of her father, the Prince Consort, on the 1st of July, 1862, at Osborne. After a married life of singular interest and usefulness, the Princess died of diphtheria on the 14th of December, 1878.

A second Prince, Alfred—now Duke of Edinburgh—was born on the 6th of August, 1844. On the 23rd of January, 1874, he was married at St. Petersburg to the Grand Duchess Marie of Russia, daughter of the Czar Alexander II. The marriage was celebrated first according to the Greek ritual, and then according to the English. In the succeeding March the newly-wedded pair made a

public entry into London, but the proceedings were somewhat marred

by a heavy snowstorm.

Princess Helena was born on the 25th of May, 1846. She married on the 5th July, 1866, Prince Christian of Schleswig-Holstein. The bride was in her twenty-first and the bridegroom in his thirty-sixth year. The Princess was accompanied to the altar by her mother and the Prince of Wales, and the Queen gave

her daughter away.

The Princess Louise was born on the 18th of March, 1848, and was married on the 21st of March, 1871, to the Marquis of Lorne. The Queen herself gave away the bride, who "was very pale," says Lord Ronald Gower, the "best man" on the occasion, "but handsome, as she always is."

The third son and seventh child of the Queen and the Prince Consort was born on the 1st of May, 1850. This happened to be the birthday of the Duke of Wellington, so he was called Arthur after the Duke.

Prince Arthur became in time Duke of Connaught. On the 13th of March, 1879, he married Princess Louise Marguerite of Prussia. The wedding at Windsor was a very grand affair, the grandest that had taken place since the marriage of the Princess Royal. The bride was given away by her father, the "Red Prince," who had been so conspicuous at Königgrätz and Sedan.

The next arrival was Prince Leopold, who was born on the 7th of April, 1853. He was the only one of the Queen's family whose general health gave cause for anxiety.

Prince Leopold was married to the Princess

Prince Leopold was married to the Princess Helen, daughter of the Prince of Waldeck, on the 27th of April, 1882. In the autumn of that year he took his bride to the Highlands, and the young couple were escorted in grand style from Ballater Station to Balmoral.

"The pipes preceded," says the Queen, "playing the 'Highland Laddie,' Brown and all our other kilted men walking alongside, and before and behind the carriage, every-

body else close following; and a goodly number they were."

A little daughter was born to Prince Leopold in 1883, but in March of the following year the child was fatherless. The Prince had gone to Cannes on account of his health, and he died there on the 28th of March, to the great grief of all who had observed the promise of his short career. A son was born in July, 1884, about four months after the father's death.

The Princess Beatrice was born on the 14th of April, 1857, and, being the youngest, was long the pet of the family. In one of the Prince Consort's letters to the Princess Royal he gives an amusing account of her. "The little aunt," he says, "makes daily

nttle aunt," he says, "makes dally progress, and is really too comical. When she tumbles, she calls out in bewilderment, 'she don't like it! she don't like it!' and she came in to breakfast, a morning or two ago, moaning, 'Baby has been so naughty; poor baby, so naughty!"

In a subsequent letter the Prince Consort, writing to the Princess Royal about her little girl, says, "I advise her to model her-

advise her to model herself after her aunt Beatrice.
That excellent lady has now not a moment to spare.
'I have no time,' she says, to do anything, I must write letters to my niece.'"

Early in 1885 it was announced that the Princess Beatrice, who for many years had been the constant companion of Her Majesty, had been betrothed with Her Majesty's consent to Prince Henry of Battenberg, third son of Prince Alexander of Hesse. The marriage took place on the 23rd of July.

We have now mentioned all the children of Her

Majesty. Whatever the trials of the Queen's life, and they have been many and great, she has had no slight compensation in the happy marriages of her sons and daughters, and in completing on the 20th of June, 1887, the fiftieth year of her reign, it must form a pleasing subject of reflection that in these domestic joys, as well as in her domestic sorrows, Her Majesty has ever been sure of the sympathy of her people.

Queen Victoria, we may add in conclusion, is the fourth English sovereign whose reign has extended to fifty years. The first of our monarchs who had so long a reign was Henry III., who completed his year of jubilee on October 27th, 1266. The next was his great grandson, Edward III., who finished his fifty years on the 24th of January, 1377. After that, nearly five hundred years elapsed before the people of this country witnessed the jubilee of another sovereign. The third to reign for fifty years was George III., who completed that term on 24th of October, 1810.
