The Wymondham Road 3 House development has been given planning permission. Cllr. Keith Morris has been asked to keep an eye on the work and liaise with residents, the developer and SNC.

The Council formally complained to SNC about the on-going planning application for the field next to the Village Hall. Villagers asked for this months ago. However, we consider that the time is now right given that so much time has elapsed and there is a clear issue to raise with SNC.


We have received a request for a Penny Green noticeboard. This is a good match to the purpose of the CIL funds to improve communication around the village. We will discuss it at our next meeting.

Our next meeting is on 12th March at 7.30pm in the Margaret Preston Room in the Village Hall. We will be pleased to see you there.



The Mobile Library


Mobile Library in Wreningham: Mondays 4th February and 4th March at both Stevens Lane (4pm) and the Village Hall (4.25pm)

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The Story of Spratts Coaches

Spratts Coaches was started in the early 1950's by the late Mr Colin Spratt.

He began the business with a taxi, delivering groceries from his parents' village store based in the centre of the village,

transporting school lunches to local schools, also taking local children to and from school, plus any taxi work that was required. It was soon apparent that taxis were not large enough and with the demand increasing Colin bought his first coach.

Things just start to expand! It was not just local village groups or school outings he ran. In the early 1950's he started tours to Switzerland and various other places throughout Europe. (He was one of the first coach operators in Norfolk to take a coach abroad).

In December 1955 he married Gwen Symonds who helped him run the business throughout her life.

Over the next few decades the business expanded rapidly and at one stage operated 30 vehicles from the same original base at Wreningham.

Colin always came up with new ideas, being the first company in Norfolk to have coaches adapted for the disabled that took fixed wheelchairs so customers who were wheelchair bound could go out for the day. The first to have large seating capacity coaches up to 57 seats in Norfolk.

Colin and his wife retired from the day to day running of the company in the 1990's but kept a very active interest in it, advising their children Christine Bilham, Richard Spratt & Anne Riches in the running of the company.

In 2001 Colin died suddenly and the business was then run by Christine & Richard. Gwen died of Alzheimer's in September 2016.

Sadly, Spratts Coaches finally closed for business at the end of 2018.

A Message from the NHS: Help Us Help You

Just a reminder from the NHS in Norfolk and Waveney about how to help us help you this winter. All of us should be making sure our medicine cabinets are stocked. It's sensible to order any regular medicines you need in good time so you don't run out, taking care to only order what you need. If you do feel poorly, seek advice from your local pharmacist before it gets worse. If it's urgent, then a call to your GP or NHS111 is the next step, and they'll advise you what to do.

Common sickness bugs - Suffering from norovirus or other common sickness bugs? Don't spread it around by visiting your GP or other public places. Stay at home and rest.

Home First – your bed is the best bed!

The NHS and social care across all of Norfolk and Waveney are stressing that if someone needs a hospital or temporary care bed they will get one, but our aim is always to help people get back home as soon as possible. Being back home can also help a speedier recovery. So if you know anybody who has to go into hospital it would be kind to make sure they have all they need to get back home, including checking the heating works and they will have food in the house, the washing is done and they feel OK.
