WRENINGHAM PARISH COUNCIL

With the onset of winter and the prospect of wetter weather, please ensure that your ditches and pipes adjacent to your property are clear. This may help to alleviate flooding problems. A certain amount of remedial work on the village's drainage system has been carried out during the summer and this is ongoing, with the Church Road scheme being started in October. However, it may cause a fair amount of disturbance in this part of the village for a while but we hope the end result is worthwhile.

The Parish Council has been lobbying for some time for a speed limit to be introduced along our section of the Blll3, and especailly for some form of traffic calming at the Mill Lane/Toprow Junction. With the opening of the Wymondham bypass the rate of traffic along this section of the road is likely to increase.

WRENINGHAM "ALL SAINTS"

The Churches Cycle Ride Day was a fine one. Over 50 people checked in at the church and several cycled for "All Saints" and our thanks go to them and those who kindly helped man the church all day. The sum raised it not yet known.

A Christmas Fayre is being organised to raise funds for the church - hopefully the final details will be available in time for distribution with this publication.

While shopping in Somerfields I overheard a conversation between 2 people who have deceased relatives buried at "All Saints". They were commenting on the state of the churchyard. The church does not have the funds to pay anybody to cut the grass on a regular basis, but they can refund out of pocket expenses, e.g. fuel. If every able bodied person who had deceased relatives in the churchyard was to give of a little time in their memory and took responsibility for a small area then the churchyard would soon begin to look tidy. At present a very few people actually do get involved and to them we should say "thank you" for your time.

CRICKET REPORT

This summer there has been plenty of runs scored on hard dusty pitches. Wreningham have once again achieved a creditable position in the Burgess Shield, finishing fourth under Richard Rix's captaincy.

Practically all the main batsmen have scored at least one half century and most 2 or 3. Graham Robbie achieved the best score with a fine 123 against New Buckenham, in a game which so demoralised the opposition that Wreningham beat them by 172 runs.

Two very improved players came from either end of the age scale with young Alex Brighton proving himself to be a useful alrounder and stylish batsman, whilst Barney Howes proved that you can still learn after the "big 40" with some good undefeated innings.

Friendlies once again proved a springboard for younger players, and bowling changes?! The inter-village competition was won by Ashwellthorpe, who beat Wreningham in the first round and Tacolneston in the final.
