2022, a year for the history books: on-going Covid-19, the Winter Olympics, the Queen's Jubilee, the Queen's death and subsequent lying in state in Westminster Hall, the succession of King Charles III, a war in Europe, an England UEFA Cup win, a new WVHMC, COP27, 3 Prime Ministers with associated cabinets of "new" ministers, Vangelis dies, discovery of micronovae, the Large Hadron Collider restarts, the James Webb Telescope opens for business, an energy crisis, 8 billion people, NASA's moon rocket launched, etc., etc. A bit of a "curate's egg"!

In 2023, we hope to launch a project which will involve the whole community for years to come. When we have some solid information, we'll let you know more. For now though, and for the 3rd year, we are arranging for a Christmas Tree and lights to be installed at the Reading Room. The lighting ceremony is planned for **Friday 2nd December around 6.30pm.**

We ask you to look around the village and consider what you can do to improve matters for you and your neighbours, for example:

- Trimming Ensure your hedges, trees, brambles are not a threat to others. Be careful and considerate when disposing of the cuttings.
- Flooding Winters are expected to become warmer and wetter, bringing a
 lot more rainfall and an increase in the risk of flooding so if you have
 watercourse(s) (drains, stream, ditches, gulleys) running across your land,
 please ensure that they are cleared of debris & extraneous growth.
- Litter there are a number of litter picking sets around the village (ask the clerk for details) for you to borrow when out for a walk. Picking up a few items of litter as you go can make a big difference – as one of our younger parishioners has demonstrated very ably during the year.
- Parking most of us can park off-road. However, inconsiderate parking has been a theme during the year, especially at school-run times. Perhaps you can advise people that short term parking is available at the village hall car park?
- Speeding despite our roads being narrow, we still receive complaints about those who exceed the 30mph speed limit and endanger other road users such as pedestrians, children, animals. Please slow down to 20mph.

Recycling News

Our total raised has now reached £835 and I've been able to send a further £222 to PACT which is fantastic. Thank you everyone. I'm trying to send a consignment every month and this is no different. Waiting to go will be £12kg of crisp packaging, 3kg of coffee bags, 5kg of cheeses wrappers and 10kg of eco coffee pods. A lot of this is down to the help of Jenny and John Bligh and I thank them for their box stuffing skills.

Crisp packaging continues to come in on a regular basis which is fantastic. Can I please stress they must be empty of contents, not folded, rolled, scrunched up, tied in a knot, stuffed with other things nor folded into tiny origami triangles. To help you better understand, not only do I need to see what it is, I also somehow have to squeeze many, many packets into a box that appears to hold only a fraction of what I'm, sending. Therefore, each and every small crisp packet, large snack packet and outside multipack wrappers has to be flattened to get them in the box. Many of you already do this and I'm massively grateful but hopefully, having more information will help you appreciate the best way to pass things on to me.

Christmas is a time for giving and for generating lots of waste. Remember cards and paper with glitter are not recyclable. They have to go in landfill.

I know we all have lots on our minds and, whilst we want to do as much as we can to reduce our waste, it's hard. We only have so much time. All we can do is <u>try</u> to reduce our waste, or change it to something that's recyclable. Opt for cans or glass rather than plastic, refill rather than buying packaged, re-use rather than buy again. Last year I experimented with furoshiki packaging. I bought a large square silk scarf and knotted it around a particularly difficult to wrap present. It was perfect; no sellotape or tearing either. Not only that but the recipient didn't want the scarf so gave it back to me and I've used it twice more and still have it!



Wreningham All Saints

Firstly, an update on the removal of the choir pews. We are now preparing reports required to make formal application for their removal but we anticipate that it will be some months before we know if we can carry out the work.

The quiz at Wreningham in October in aid of Ashwellthorpe and Wreningham fabric funds was supported by about 80 people many of whom are local but do not normally worship with us. They all seemed to enjoy the evening and we made £525.00 (Ash. £262.50/Wren. £262.50)

Saturday 10 October – it was a very early start for some of us, but the weather was kind and again there was such a good turnout and the atmosphere was really good. The refreshment tables were all occupied so people were not in a hurry to leave us. The total taken was £927.05 and the expenses were hall hire and 2 new "plant sale" banners - £90.50. The plants made £291.40. Jean and her team in the kitchen and made £124.90. The sale of cakes and apples made £178.30. Ashwellthorpe, Forncett St Mary, Forncett St Peter, Tacolneston and

Wreningham each had a table top in aid of their fabric fund and between them raised over £325.00. Thank you to all who helped or supported in any way.

Thank you to all those people who gave, helped or supported the "Christmas Bazaar", especially thanks to Jean and her team for taking care of refreshments. The event raised about £380 to be shared between Wreningham and Ashwellthorpe church fabric funds.

<u>Carols by Candlelight</u> – Tuesday 20th December at 7 pm. Our traditional Carols and Readings service – lit by candles as usual.

Hopefully you will receive a Church Christmas card with this Mardle, which will give details of the other Christmas season services

Movie afternoon - The church wasn't able to get a grant for a "warm space" activity but we have a licence which will allow us to show a limited selection of films providing we don't charge admission and don't advertise the name of the film – just a short summary. We'd like to offer what help we can to those struggling this winter, be it financially or from loneliness. Wreningham Village Hall has better facilities than our churches so we plan to use the hall following each last Wednesday Coffee Morning. It will be warm so we'll hire the hall from 12 noon on those days. We'll provide a soup and jacket potato style lunch for anybody wanting a hot meal at 1 pm, providing they pre-book. No charge but a donation is optional. To book lunch contact Christine on 01508 488123. The film is open to anybody and we would love to see a good turn-out. It will start at 2 pm with doors open at 1.45 pm. Again, no charge but we will be providing tea and coffee afterwards - a donation would be acceptable.
